EDITORIAL

This Almatourism special issue contains abstracts and working papers presented at the international conference "Tourism management and sustainability of heritage sites: the role of education and training" organised in Assisi – Italy – in November 2013. The conference was the last public event of the project Her.cul.es - Strengthening the attractiveness of European higher education in Heritage and Cultural Tourism (http://www.herculesproject.eu/), a project financed by the European Union under the Erasmus Mundus programme 2009-2013 (http://eacea.ec.europa.eu/erasmus_mundus/).

The conference addressed a central issue, since nowadays, despite the growing need for the enhancement and protection of our cultural and natural heritage, there is still a lack of qualified specialists with adequate management skills who can respond to the current challenges in heritage management and who will ensure the sites' conservation and sustainable use. In this context, it becomes essential the role that institutions of higher education as well as other training institutions can have, through the development of ad hoc training courses, relying on innovative approaches based on a synergistic collaboration with local communities and the tourism industry. Given this premise, the conference aimed at providing a forum for academics, tourism professionals, researchers, policy-makers and students from tourism-related fields to exchange ideas and discuss research and approaches on heritage education and training - ranging from higher education to professional training - for building skills and technical proficiencies for conservation and sustainable tourism management of heritage sites. The proceedings are organised according to the three main sessions of the conference: the first one is devoted to the presentation of Her.cul.es project and its results, the second one focuses on the training strategies and approaches for heritage tourism management, and the third one is dedicated to the presentation of case studies and field experiences.

During the first session, the final video of the project – *Hercules: A Bridge over the Mediterranean* – was also presented. It content is partly given in the first paper that describes Her.cul.es project and its main results. It is still possible to visualize the video in the web-site and YouTube channel of the project.

The papers are published in the original delivery language (English or Italian). All the abstracts have been translated into English, French and Arabic. Many thanks
